Page 252, paragraph 5. Should read:

“Four wineries yeast with Active Dry Montrachet, five with Active Dry Pasteur Champagne 595, four with Active Dry California Champagne 505, and one each with Montrachet culture, Champagne culture Ay, Steinberg culture, and winery’s own isolate.”

Page 255, paragraph 5: Should read:

“Fourteen wineries.....Montrachet instead of California Champagne 505; one uses Assmannshausen in Pinot noir....instead of California Champagne 505 and French White; one uses French Red instead of Pasteur Champagne 595 or Steinberg.....”

Page 31, column 2, paragraph 1.
